Dave McNamara followed his scaffolder father into construction at 15. He started at the bottom with no qualifications, yet remembers being surrounded by characters and enjoying work so much he'd come home at night asking himself, 'Do I get paid to do this? How much fun!'

Worksites were filled with banter and social gatherings after knock-off were common. No-one was referred

to by their real name, and finding your boots nailed to the floor or your nail bag stapled to the wall (probably with your chisel siliconed into its pouch) was shrugged off as just another day on the tools.

Progress took time – not least because the training was so thorough. 'You can always pick somebody who worked for a major company back then – Civil and Civic, Leightons, John Holland – because they've been taught properly. People might laugh, but you even got taught how to use the broom and shovel properly, you got taught how to clean.'

Starting out as the 'peggy', Dave would collect 60–70 'smokos' and lunches from the local shop, clean the toilets and sweep up the site. 'You didn't stuff anyone's order up or you

got chased out of the shed. But you did get a free feed – you'd pinch a few chips on the way back!'

Peace of mind

Now, after 35 years in materials handling driving hoists, forklifts and tower cranes, he's using the skills he picked up as a company Delegate to help lighten ACIRT Southern Region Coordinator Ben Manna's load. Having been a founding member of ACIRT when it was launched in 1987, Dave knows how vital the fund is for workers' security and peace of mind.

'The scheme is fantastic, and it's quite unique. The union movement have fought to have it incorporated

in their EBA, and I know how important it is for workers to have something to fall back on.'

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Dave is a keen bike rider who loves being at home in the Blue Mountains. Yet he's excited by the prospect of being on the road for ACIRT, not least because it's already put him back in touch with many familiar faces who've crossed his path over a long

construction journey.

'I love seeing the members, it's great getting on a site. It's fantastic that I've already been able to reacquaint with guys I haven't seen for 20 years, it ignites some old memories of great fun.'



Tiarnee Franks has worked in a car dealership that sold everything from other people's cast-offs to flash new European models. She's worked in disability and for the Police Citizens Youth Club, and been a stay-at-home mum for her four daughters.

Finding her way into construction, via an Aboriginal employment agency and a Tafe course that taught her the fundamentals, has been her own personal game-changer.

'Because I'm such an active person, to feel better I need to feel active and physically fit. It challenges me mentally and physically – it's new to me, so I'm learning something pretty much every day. Construction is ideal for me, it's worked out really well.'

Going down to the work site in the hoist on her first day will stay with her forever, emotions swirling, nervous yet excited. She knows it's stereotyped as a 'male industry', but as Tiarnee uses a jackhammer, drill or grinder, carries and ties steel and combines being a steel-fixer and

labourer, she feels supported, valued and right at home.

Respectful workplace

'I didn't know what I was going to come up against, but they've all been so good. They've taught me a lot, they're very respectful. All the boys lend a hand if I need it, they come and help.'

Tiarnee knew of ACIRT before she started in the industry, through construction-worker friends and family who are members, and she welcomes the backstop of having financial help at the ready should the work on a project dry up before the next job comes along.

Having four girls aged seven to 17 is all the more reason to cherish that safety net. She describes them as tomboys who like to get up to the local oval to kick a ball around, but whether they'll follow their mother's lead when it comes to work might be a matter of

each to their own.

'The 15-year-old, I might get her into it in the future, she's like me. My older daughter just looks at me and shakes her head. But they're proud of mummy. Who knows, maybe we'll bring a few more girls into the industry one day.'

BRINGING SECURITY IN THE FACE OF SHUTDOWN

Ben Manna, ACIRT Southern Region Co-ordinator

Ben Manna's father was a career construction worker and a union official for 30 years. Ben followed his lead in the early 1990s when he became a 'chippy'. It's easy to imagine they'd seen everything the industry could bowl up — until last year, when it ground to a halt.

'I'd never seen that happen, and I don't remember as a kid growing up the construction industry ever being shut down,' Ben says. 'It's had some bad patches, but it's never been completely shut down.'

After the unprecedented happened and Sydney building sites fell silent midway through 2021, as the COVID-19 pandemic grew to unprecedented levels of concern, the nervousness and anxiety among workers was driven home to Ben in each phone call and email exchange with ACIRT members. Partners even reached out, worried sick about what lay ahead.

'People were scared – this is something that had never happened. We'd gone through lockdowns in 2020 and the construction industry was protected, it never shut down. When this happened a lot of people were in shock – they'd felt pretty secure that they were working in an industry that wouldn't be impacted, or that they'd at least still be working.

'Mentally they struggled – a lot of people have got big mortgages, and they were worried that they couldn't make their payments or pay rent and were going into debt.'

Covid payment

Bricklayers can't work from home, neither can form workers or crane drivers. Even after the initial Sydney shutdown eased, many of those impacted were unable to get back on the tools because they lived in local government areas where the virus was rife. Thankfully, ACIRT was there for them.

Through ACIRT's 'Covid Payment' members who were stood down for at least two weeks could access \$5,000.

and the same amount again if they were still out of work five weeks later. From the start of the NSW shutdown, more than 4,200 members accessed payments of nearly \$20 million.

Ben also spoke to many employers who were grateful that ACIRT was there to help, having feared that paying out workers who sought to claim their leave entitlements to tide them over could send their businesses to the wall.

As the 2022 outlook remains uncertain, having ACIRT behind you is more vital than ever.

'I've had so many people come and see me on jobs and say, "I'm so thankful I've got my ACIRT – I couldn't get back to work and it was there for me", Ben says. 'A lot of people were very relieved their ACIRT was there, without it they could have lost their house or not been able to feed the family.'

Barry Martin has always loved the reliability of his job, that no matter what was happening in the world he'd be on the road visiting worksites and having a yarn with construction workers. Certainty has given way to the unknown, which makes Barry even more grateful for ACIRT.

'We've had times in Queensland in the past two years where the pandemic hasn't really impacted people's lives too much – they've been able to keep working and going about their business,' Barry says. 'But then Omicron came along, and we've all had to learn to live with it.'

After the initial shock of COVID-19's arrival in 2019, which impacted Barry's ability to do what he loves best – get out on site and talk to workers – 2021 felt like a pathway out of the mire as vaccination rates rose and our resistance built.

The rising infection rates caused by the more easily-transmissible Omicron variant of the virus have created a virtual 'watch and act' scenario, one that Barry says members can approach with the comforting knowledge that ACIRT has their backs.

'We've been lucky at times, but Covid is here now and we don't know what that will mean for the next few months or even years,' Barry says. 'There could be more restrictions and even shutdowns, or construction workers could face other issues that they haven't had to deal with before.

'That's why ACIRT is there – it's got their backs and gives them reassurance that everything will be okay.'

Barry is looking forward to a 2022 that will bring people together again, and encourages employees and employers alike to use the services ACIRT offers either by picking up the phone for a

IN A TIME OF LOSS

Colm Munroe, Health and Safety Representative

Colm Munroe was 15 when he left school in Ireland and began his journey in construction. It's taken him to Australia, back home and back again, and almost four decades later he's still loving the opportunity to better himself and help those around him.

Having cut his teeth as a bricklayer in a Dublin training centre all those years ago, Colm now furthers himself with the help of the ACIRT Education Foundation. Since he stopped laying bricks, stone and blocks and became a Health and Safety Representative, he's accessed two grants to help pay for extra training that he knows is bettering him in so many ways.

'I've always been a pretty strong union member, and through that I was interested in my own safety and other workers' safety,' Colm says.

'Being a Health and Safety Rep, the training has helped me do my job better – consulting with management and workers, it's been a big help. I was fairly strong in my views beforehand, but now I know exactly what I'm talking about.'

Eighty percent paid up to \$2,000

ACIRT Region Coordinator Ben Manna says grants are available to any members with a positive ACIRT balance to access extra training for anything from hoist to crane tickets, traffic control to offshore oil-rigging. Successful applicants have 80 percent of the cost of training paid for up to \$2,000.

'It doesn't come out of ACIRT profits – it's a pool of money and the interest is spent each year on training, so it never runs out,' Ben says, adding that workers who can no longer work in construction due to injury can also access funds for retraining to work in other industries.

Colm, who was a union delegate before he became a HSR representative, says Ben encouraged him to look into what the foundation offers when he was keen to take on more work health and safety training. MUA CENTEUR POCK SOLIO

The process was straightforward, and after paying for the course upfront the money was refunded promptly.

'A lot of members I don't think probably know about it, so it's a good thing that you're writing about it now. There's only a finite amount of funds, people need to be thinking about the training they need and get on the website and apply.

'It just keeps you employable, puts you onto the next level,' he says of education. 'I enjoy doing it myself, it's pushing you onto the next thing in your career. Whatever you're doing in construction, it's a big help.'

Work a godsend


