# HOW ONE SIMPLE ERROR

## **COULD COST YOU A FORTUNE**

**Ben Manna**, One of ACIRT's Southern Region Co-ordinators

Ben Manna vividly remembers having an emotional conversation with the widow of a long-time construction worker a couple of years ago.

She couldn't work out why her husband's account balance was so low, with not even enough funds to make him eligible for a funeral benefit. What made it even more strange was that his long-term employer was known to be a reliable ACIRT contributor.

"After a bit of investigation we discovered that he actually had four accounts with a total balance of about \$90,000," Ben recalls. "It turned out that his employer had changed company names and re-logged his details each time, creating multiple accounts.

"If we didn't pick that up, his widow might never have got that money and would have missed out on the \$8,000 funeral benefit as well."

Ben, ACIRT's NSW/ACT Co-ordinator, said this case showed the danger of employers making simple errors when creating ACIRT accounts – a misspelt name, an incorrect date of birth, using an abbreviated first name or

## MULTIPLE ACCOUNTS WHAT TO LOOK FOR

In recent months ACIRT has put a focus on trying to consolidate members' multiple accounts.

"For years we've campaigned to make sure workers have their details correct and up to date, but now we've been doing work behind the scenes to address the issue with the data we get from employers," Ben says.

"We've been working through the causes and trying to rectify those issues. Approaching members who have got those issues and moving to a system where we've got mandatory criteria for employers to eliminate that duplication."

Ben said one red flag for ACIRT members might be receiving duplicate sets of mail about their account, or possibly receiving a new card with a different membership number.

Another behind-the-scenes focus for Ben over the past six months was the preparation for the launch of the new ACIRT phone app.


"It will make life easier for members,"



it much easier to check their balance, review employer contributions and make claims."

Ben said ACIRT planned to follow up the launch with a more advanced version of the app in the coming months. In the meantime, as always, much of his time will be spent getting out to worksites and talking to ACIRT members.

# KEEPING PACE WITH THE BOOM

Just like the construction workers he keeps an eye on, ACIRT Co-ordinator Barry Martin is busier than ever as an infrastructure boom sweeps across Queensland.

Barry expects that trend to continue as the State builds towards hosting the 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games.

"And as the work picks up with the projects that need to get done ahead of the Olympics, we think we'll see a lot of interstate workers coming into Queensland," Barry says.

He expects ACIRT will be part of the agreements set up to cover new projects, which will mean additional memberships for workers from the southern states.

Barry also suggested the change of Federal Government in May would help fast-track a few infrastructure projects slated for Queensland that had been put on the back burner.


In late 2021 the Queensland Government released a detailed program of its four-year \$52.2 billion infrastructure spend and followed up in 2022 with its 20-year State Infrastructure Strategy.

As it is, Barry has been busy looking after the ACIRT needs of workers on the Cross River Rail project, scheduled to be completed next year, and the ongoing Brisbane Metro project. He is also conscious of assisting those members working on the many new projects in regional Queensland.

## MAKING LIFE THAT BIT EASIER FOR MEMBERS

Barry says he was really pleased that, despite the difficult financial times, ACIRT was able to pay a decent distribution to members in November. "Our members were happy with the distribution that we were able to deliver – particularly some of the new workers who have only been with us for a couple of years," Barry says. "Other funds couldn't do it, or their dividend was a lot, lot smaller.

He is also confident that ACIRT's new phone app will make life easier for members. "They'll be able to check on and update their details and it will give them certainty that their money will always be transferred straight into their account," Barry says.

"They'll have the ability to just have a quick look on their phone and if their employer hasn't paid contributions they can follow up with me or one of the other c-oordinators and say 'hey, what's going on, I've been on this project for a few months now and haven't seen any money go in.' And then we can do a search and help sort things out for them."

of a welcome career change, but Victor says his mate had spent so long training his body twice a day and living a life of strict routine that he jumped at the chance.


#### LIFE'S UNCERTAINTY

Shane's arrival on the work site has been a reminder to Victor of how hard on the body his trade can be. The past year has shown him we don't know what's around the corner as two colleagues have died. It's been a comfort that ACIRT has been there for their families. "At those terrible times it's there not only for the worker, but for the family they leave behind."

He knows ACIRT is there for his family too, wife Laura – who Victor says will jump in before he gets a chance as they're driving through Sydney and say, "Yeah, I know, you built that building!" – and their children Ari and Frankie. He hasn't needed to access ACIRT, but is relieved that it's there should he need it. "If you wanted to take a break it's there. If things turned pear-shaped you've got money there. Some of the guys I work with got some relief out of it during Covid. If you hit the wall you'll have something to get you through. It's a bit of security."

For Jeff Bezerra, emigrating to Australia from Brazil in 2018 was inspired by a simple mission. "I moved to start speaking English."

He remembers arriving in Sydney and not being able to have a conversation on the phone. On worksites he'd be given instructions and struggle to understand what was being asked of him. "The first six months it was really, really hard. I'd hear someone, 'Can you do this?' and I'm like, '\$#@! What did he say?'"

At home he'd worked at the port, seeing huge cargo ships come and go on their global travels, but had no experience in construction. In Australia he's been broadening not only his vocabulary to the point that English is now second nature, but his skillset and experience too – driving a construction company truck and working as a labourer in various guises, most recently with Versatile on The Ribbon project at Darling Harbour.

"My role is getting ready for the tilers – organising pallets, moving sand, cement and tiles as close as possible, so they can tile corridors, bathrooms, walls, whatever is needed." The rate of progress as this iconic structure rises has impressed him. "When I started last year we were on level 10 and below, now we're on level 25."

#### **RUNNING THERAPY**

Jeff feels blessed to be young, fit and healthy. He recently turned 29, and likes to challenge himself at weekends by adding a half marathon to the shorter runs he manages during the working week. "That's my therapy to disconnect from everything – social media, all problems – and just focus on my run."
From what he's heard of the industry in Brazil, Jeff thinks himself lucky to be working in construction in Australia rather than at home. He knows the two landscapes are very different, and was amazed to be introduced to ACIRT and to discover he and his fellow members have a safety net they can access if circumstances change and the work is no longer there.

"I didn't know such a thing as ACIRT could exist, but it's so good for workers, it takes away that worry."

"Sydney is pretty good for construction work, but I've seen fellas out of work."

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
